Endometrial resection

This operation, which involves removal of the womb lining, is done to relieve heavy periods and is an alternative to having a hysterectomy (where the womb is removed).

Results

The majority of patients benefit from endometrial resection with:

- 30 per cent having no periods
- 30 per cent having very light periods
- 30 per cent havinglight periods

The remaining ten per cent will not have any improvement.

Advantage over hysterectomy

- It is usually performed as a day case
- It is quicker to perform so there is a shorter anaesthetic time
- Usually there is little post-operative discomfort.
- Normal activities can usually be resumed within a few days

Before admission

About four weeks before the operation, you may be asked to collect a prescription from you doctor for a course of tablets. By taking these you will make your womb lining thinner, which makes the operation easier.

The operation

You will be admitted on the day of the operation, unless told otherwise.

The operation is done under a general anaesthetic. A small instrument is passed through the vagina into the womb and the lining is carefully scraped away. This operation involves no cutting to stitching.

There is a very small risk that the surgeon may need to remove the whole womb (called a hysterectomy).

After the operation

- You will have moderate vaginal bleeding
- Any discomfort should be relieved by taking your usual mild pain relief, such as paracetamol
- You will be allowed to eat or drink soon after you return to the ward
- You will be allowed home either the same day or the day after your operation

Discharge advice

- After the operation, you are likely to have moderate vaginal bleeding. This may continue for a few weeks and should decrease to a 'bloody' discharge
- You should wear pads, not tampons, until this has stopped
- Before you go home you will be advised of any follow-up appointment
- You may return to work when you feel fit but should take a minimum od two days to rest after the operation

You have been advised of the following:

- You need to be accompanied home by an adult after your operation.
- There will be somebody with you for 24 hours after your operation.
- You live within one hour's drive of the hospital.
- You should not cook or operate kitchen appliances for 24 hours after your operation.
- You should not drive a car, ride a bike, operate heavy machinery, or make important legal or business decisions for 48 hours after your operation.
